Note to the customer:

NOTE TO THE CUSTOMER: Even if your children (in Bible class or at home) have recently studied the life of Christ, they will benefit greatly from this study. **RWS #6, Following in Christ's Footsteps**, points out many false teachings which are leading Christians astray. We must properly ground our children before they leave home so they won't fall prey to Satan when he is disguised as an angel of light (2 Cor. 11:13-15). Feel free to print out this lesson (or any of the other sample lessons) and use it at home or in Bible class. We are confident that the children you teach will benefit greatly and will be eager to study other lessons in this series.

Other topics covered in **RWS #6** include:

- Teaching about the old law and the new law.
- Why we must not follow the commandments of men.
- Jesus came to establish a spiritual kingdom, the church.
- Exposing the error of premillennialism (even though this term is not used).
- An explanation of why Christians are to remember Christ's death by partaking of communion every Sunday.
- Showing that Easter came from a pagan holiday, and must not be celebrated religiously.
- Explaining how even young people can deny Jesus (like Peter did) or stand up for Him.
- Clarifying that God's grace, although it is a free gift, does still require action on our part to accept this grace. We are not saved by faith alone (James 2:17-26).
- Teaching students that after the resurrection, Jesus instructed His disciples about the coming kingdom, or church (Acts 1:3).

Having been raised in a denomination, I know that the above includes many of the teachings that confused me as I read the Bible. We have an opportunity to plainly and clearly teach our children the Truth. Let us not fall short of this awesome responsibility.

RWS #5, The Kingdom Parables, and RWS #4, The Kingdom is the Church, would be good to use after this study. The New Testament RWSs are not presently in chronological order. The rest of the NT RWSs could be used in any order because they cover topics, not chronological events.

When I complete the chronological study of the Old Testament (**RWS #101 - #116**), I hope to work on a chronological study of the life of Christ and the establishment of the church. Due to the tragic death of my daughter in a car accident, the OT series will not be completed before 2005 at the earliest.

As you scroll down you will see the Teachers' Instructions first, and then the lesson as it appears in the book and on the CD or download. One of the coloring pages could not be reproduced here, but the content is described at the end of this document. Teachers may select which activities are best suited for the students in their classes and reproduce only those pages.

1. THE BIRTH OF CHRIST

OBJECTIVES:

Make your students aware of how blessed the world is by the fact that Christ came to earth as a baby.

Emphasize the need to teach the whole truth even on matters which seem to be unessential to salvation, such as where the wise men came to worship Jesus.

Older students should read Luke 2:15-20 and Matthew 2:9-11 in class. A flannel graph or other visual aids from previous lessons can be used to illustrate the lesson to younger students.



One suggestion to speed things up so you can complete it before class is over would be to have each student look up one passage and fill in the answer. To save time, have them write the answer only in the crossword puzzle and not on the lines. 
If you are teaching in a multi-age classroom and you feel all children need assistance with the crossword puzzle, it might be advisable to ask someone to assist you. They could take one group of children and help with the crossword puzzle for their age group, while you assist the other age group. Keep all students together while you are teaching the lesson, and then split them up when you begin the activity.

1. THE BIRTH OF CHRIST

For the next thirteen weeks we will be studying about how to follow in Christ's footsteps. We want to be like Jesus. Read 1 Peter 2:21.

Today we will be learning about the birth of our Savior, and some of the false teachings about His birth. Jesus warned, "Beware of false prophets" (Matt. 7:15).



Jesus was born in Bethlehem. Joseph had taken Mary there so he could pay his taxes. The inns were all full, so they went to a stable. When Jesus was born, Mary placed Him in a manger.

Shepherds were watching their flocks nearby. An angel told them the Savior had been born. Read Luke 2:12 to know what sign they would have to know the baby was really Jesus. Many angels joined in saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:14). Read Luke 2:15-20.

Pictures usually show another group of people coming to worship Jesus at the stable: the wise men. But the wise men did not see baby Jesus at the stable. Read Matt. 2:9-11. Jesus was a young child living in a house when the wise men came. We do not know how many wise men came, but we know they brought three types of gifts.

The Bible does not say we should celebrate the birth of Christ. Christmas is not mentioned in the Bible. Christmas was not celebrated until about 300 years after the death of Christ. Those who celebrate Christmas as the birth of Christ are following the teachings of men, not God.

Christians can celebrate Christmas, in our homes, as a time to get together with our families and give gifts. But we should remember not to be greedy and just think about how many gifts we can get for ourselves. We should want to share with others. We should be careful not to put religious symbols on our tree, because we don't want people to think we are celebrating the birth of Christ.
